Learning outcomes

At the end of the course, the student must be able to prove that he/she has acquired the following learning outcomes:

- R1 To handle with fluency the concepts and fundamental elements of philosophical anthropology that constitute the starting point for legal science.

- R3 To know the meaning of the term "person" and, above all, the scope of the concept and its implications in the legal field.
- R4 To know the great scientific and philosophical questions raised about the origin of human life, with special attention to evolutionary theories and the anthropic principle.
- R5 To know the phenomenology of human behavior with special attention to the legal phenomenon, as a manifestation of the essential legal dimension of the person.
- R6 To distinguish the different areas of human phenomenology, with particular attention to the diversity of religious, ethical and legal dimensions.
- R7 To know the essential structure of freedom and its role in shaping fundamental legal institutions.
- R8 To know the fundamental characteristics of the human conscience and its legal implications in constitutional texts.

Observations

To pass the subject in the 1st and 2nd call will be indispensable:

Punctual and participative attendance to the face-to-face sessions, which as a whole has a percentage of 5% of the final evaluation. On the other hand, the works, exercises and tests carried out throughout the course will represent 20% of the final evaluation. The punctuality in the delivery, the quality of the written communication and the creative/critical capacity will be taken into account. These continuous evaluation activities will sometimes be carried out and handed in during the practical classes. The practices do not need to be approved all, but to take them into account must be submitted on time according to schedule, either via platform or to correct in class. There will be a final work that will represent 15% of the grade in which the students will demonstrate the assimilation of the concepts. The quality of communication, creative/critical ability and the extensive use of information sources will also be taken into account. The exam must be passed (5) to average with the rest of the evaluation instruments. In the case of not passing the exam, the final grade of the course will be the grade obtained in the exam.

Penalties.

Spelling or grammatical mistakes in exams and assignments:- Misspellings imply a subtraction of up to 10% in both the practicals and the final exam of the subject (spelling, grammatical, lexical-semantic or pragmatic-textual).

Attendance.

Single evaluation: According to article 9 of the General Regulations for Evaluation and Grading of Official Studies and UCV's own degrees, the continuous evaluation system is the preferred evaluation system at the UCV. Art. 10 allows, however, for those students who, in a justified and accredited way, show their inability to attend in person (or to synchronous communication activities for virtual and/or hybrid teaching modalities), their extraordinary evaluation in the so-called single evaluation. This single evaluation must be requested within the first month of each semester to the Dean's Office of the Faculty through the Vice-Dean's Offices or Master's Directorates, competing to this the express decision on the admission of the request of the student concerned.



The evidence to be presented and/or the test/s to be performed in the single evaluation by the student will be carried out through the same theoretical test as for the rest of the students and through a practical test consisting of the delivery of the practices carried out during the course, although the percentages given to the different evaluation instruments will be as follows: 40% practical tests and 60% theoretical tests.

CLASS ATTENDANCE IN FACE-TO-FACE DEGREES

In accordance with the development guidelines of the General Regulations for the Evaluation and Qualification of Official Teachings and Own Degrees of the UCV, in face-to-face degrees, class attendance with a minimum of 80% of the sessions of each subject will be required as a requirement to be evaluated. This means that, if a student does not attend the sessions of each subject, in a percentage greater than 20%, he/she will not be able to be evaluated, neither in the first nor in the second call, unless the person responsible for the subject, with the approval of the person responsible for degree, in view of duly justified exceptional circumstances, exempt from the minimum attendance percentage. The same criterion will be applicable for hybrid or virtual degrees in which teachers must maintain the same percentage in the requirement of "presence" in the different training activities, if any, even if these are carried out in virtual environments.

MENTION OF DISTINCTION:

The mention of "Honors" may be awarded to students who have obtained a grade equal to or greater than 9.0. Their number may not exceed five percent of the students enrolled in a group in the corresponding academic year, unless the number of students enrolled is lower.

Learning activities

The following methodologies will be used so that the students can achieve the learning outcomes of the subject:

- M1 Group work sessions supervised by the teacher. Study of legal cases, both true and fictitious. Significant construction of knowledge through student interaction and activity. Critical analysis of values and social commitment.
- M7 The students must read some specific texts that are connected with the module and be able to present their conclusions.
- M8 Exposition of contents by the teacher, analysis of competences, explanation and demonstration of capacities, skills and knowledge in the classroom.
- M11 Personalised attention and in small groups. Period of instruction and/or orientation carried out by a tutor with the aim of reviewing and discussing the materials and topics presented in the classes, seminars, readings, completion of assignments, etc.



- M12 Set of written and/or oral tests used in the initial, formative or summative evaluation of the student.
- M13 Group preparation of readings, essays, resolution of problems, seminars, papers, dossiers, etc., to be presented or delivered in theory classes, practical classes, and/or small group tutorials.
- M14 Student's study: individual preparation of readings, essays, problem-solving, seminars, works, reports, etc. to present or deliver in the theoretical classes, practical classes and/or small group tutorials.
